Embrace Complexity

Seek out opportunities to engage in conversation on complex topics, especially staying informed of current events.

Selection committees want to see that you can grapple with nuanced, complicated issues without obvious or simple solutions.



Challenge Yourself

Enroll in challenging courses that expand your academic trajectory and perspective. Selection committees want to see that you are challenging yourself, both in breadth and depth.



Specialize

When you encounter topics or issues that excite you, follow that lead.

Selection committees will be impressed with the level of expertise you have developed through deep study and engagement.



Build Relationships

Build relationships with faculty members outside the classroom and maintain them over time. Not only do faculty make great mentors, but selection committees often look to letters of rec as confirmation of your talents.



Conduct Research

Conduct faculty-mentored research.

The transition from being a consumer of knowledge to a producer of knowledge is an important indicator of maturity for selection committees.



Make an Impact

Make an impact on an organization or club, pursuing opportunities for leadership and change-making.

Celebrate Differences
